Myriam and her family moved to the United States 15 years ago from Argentina, settling in Chicago. In 2007, her husband and son Brian took a trip to Durango and fell in love with the town. The family eventually relocated here in 2009.

Brian struggled at school and sought other alternatives. Brian came to the Durango Education Center in 2010 and attained his GED May 2011. After getting his GED, Brian


worked to save money for college but eventually looked into more-affordable colleges abroad. In October 2013, Brian started attending The Adventist University of the Philippines. Living in the dorms on campus, Brain interacts with students from all over the world and is thoroughly enjoying his college experience.

With her son off to college, Myriam had more time to focus on her own goals. "I wanted to get my GED about 10 years ago but was busy with the kids and a little scared to go back to school – I hadn't gone to school since 1977," said Myriam. A nanny by trade, she was looking for a new career as it became increasingly difficult to lift the children she cared for due to her hip problems.

Myriam started the DEC's English as a Second Language (ESL) Program in February 2014. "I knew I needed to improve my pronunciation and vocabulary, even though people think I speak English well enough," she said with a smile. The ESL teachers at the Center quickly found out Myriam was ready for higher-level English and encouraged her to enroll in the GED program. Just like her son did a couple years ago, Myriam is now taking classes to get her GED. Excited to start a new chapter in her life, she plans to pursue a career in medical billing.


- 90 students from other countries learned English

Financial Report

Due to some very generous donations and well-timed grant awards, our programs continue to thrive even though we do not receive funding from the State of Colorado.

We are pleased to report that the Durango Education Center's federal grants for ESL and GED programs will continue for the 2014-15 year. The Center was only one of fifteen programs selected for this grant statewide. While this grant does not cover the entire cost of these essential programs, it will enable us to add summer GED and ESL classes beginning this July.

Program Updates

New GED Test. The 2014 GED Test differs significantly from the version released in 2002, the last time the test was revamped. Now aligned with the Common Core State Standards, the four subject tests – Language Arts, Social Studies, Science and Math – are all computer-based and take longer to complete. The Reading and Writing tests from the previous GED were combined into one test, Language Arts. The Math Test is now 55% algebra and requires more analytical thinking. The new GED exam is a true high school equivalency series of tests. "Two of the tests require substantial writing – Language Arts and Social Studies – and students must analyze and compare and contrast differing perspectives on important topics relevant to today's adults," explains GED Program Manager Stephanie Moran. "Gone are the days when adult learners just needed to be a decent reader and our instructors could



fill in a few gaps for them to pass the test. Now students need to be problem solvers and devise answers versus choosing from a multiple choice menu. The new GED prepares graduates for college and the workplace more thoroughly than the older version." In 2013, donations covered \$1,800 in GED test fees. In 2014, students have even greater expenses: not only has the cost of the GED Exams increased, there is now a charge for practice tests. Summer School 2014. The DEC will be offering summer classes from its GED, ESL and Community Education Programs. Starting July 8 and going through August 14, classes will be offered Tuesday and Thursday evenings, 5 – 8 pm for ESL and GED.

Introducing Ballet Folklorico de Durango. DEC and Fort Lewis College's El Centro de Muchos Colores Hispano Resource Center have partnered on a pathway-to-college program that aims to increase Latino student graduation rates in La Plata County and recruit more Hispanic students at FLC. Now called "Ballet Folklorico de Durango," the dance program is a merger of the El Centro Ballet Folklorico program and the Del Alma Ballet Folklorico program. FLC Dance students teach participants, ages 5 and up, traditional Mexican dances.

U.S. Citizenship Preparation. With a grant from the City of Durango, DEC is helping more immigrants gain citizenship by training volunteers to help them pass the U.S. Naturalization Exam. "Tutors are trained to assist students on all aspects of the test, from the oral portion to the civics questions," said Libby Baumchen, ESL Program Coordinator. "The one-on-one relationship is ideal, as students can work at their own pace and reach their goal of citizenship faster." For more information, contact Libby at 385-4354 x109.

Customized Computer Training. DEC continues to deliver computer training to employees from a variety of business sectors and nonprofits, both in its onsite computer lab and at employers' worksites. Trainings can be customized to fill employees' needs, or, if businesses need to train only one or two employees, they can send them to one of the Center's open-enrollment computer training classes. GED Test Answer: \$700 **Childcare.** DEC continues to serve GED and ESL parents with its quality infant/toddler program. Availability of childcare is one of the biggest barriers for people needing to complete their education, and the onsite program allows parents to take classes while their children are receiving excellent care. The only program of its kind in the region, DEC will not be able to continue offering this licensed childcare center without additional community support. Why I Volunteer

After relocating to Durango last year, I had extra time for volunteer work while I searched for employment. I'd heard about the Durango Education Center and thought it may be a good fit. I'd done some math tutoring back East after I lost my job in the steel industry. (From 1980-2008, a thriving economy of 23,000-plus steel workers in Pittsburgh had dwindled down to about 800.)

I started to tutor math on weekdays and evenings at the DEC. In my previous tutoring experiences, I was pretty successful at getting students to overcome the fear or shyness that held them back in the public school system. Working one-on-one, I try to give DEC students the confidence and willingness to stick with basic algebra and geometry until that light comes on in their heads. I encourage students to first try to work the problems at home on their own. Then I show them what they're doing right and what short-cuts not to take.

It's been a win-win situation for the students and me. I feel good when I can give something to the community by helping a struggling math student earn their GED.
